What Do Ya Know?

Why do we use that word 'catholic' in the Nicene Creed? In his treatise, Philip Melanchthon explains "What does "catholic" mean?" / (taken from *de appelatione ecclesiae catholicae*; in *Corpus Reformatorum*, vol. 24, ed. G. Baum, E. Cunitz, and E. Reuss). "It means the same as universal. *Kath'holou* means "universally" and "in general." Why is this term added in the article of the creed...? Because it is an assembly dispersed throughout the whole world and because its members, wherever they are, and however separated in place, accept and externally profess one and the same utterance or true doctrine throughout all ages from the beginning until the very end...Those are truly called catholic who accept the doctrine of the truly catholic church, i.e., that which is supported by the witness of all time, of all ages, which believes what the prophet and apostles taught, and which does not tolerate factions, heresies, and heretical assemblies..." What do ya know?



Rector Sabbatical

Every five years, the vestry and diocese encourage and support the rector taking time away from St. Mark's for prayer, study, family time, and other possibilities. Typically, a sabbatical is twelve weeks all at one time. Considering the pandemic challenges that have been present, it will be spread out over nine months, usually a week or two at a time. The sabbatical will be split up into four parts: 1. Yoga Instructor Training – One of the alternative liturgies that St. Mark's has been developing is liturgical yoga, or Yoga Eucharist. Nancy Judson and Fr. Rick have continued to work in developing these liturgies. Fr. Rick will become better trained in the study and practice of yoga; 2. Silent Retreat – Fr. Rick will be taking time at the Abbey of St. Walburga in Colorado and other venues for silence and meditation; 3. Family Time – Trips and time away with the family; 4. Africa – The

diocese has asked that Fr. Rick return again with a team in late October to review and reinvigorate our diocesan connection with the Diocese of Kiteto (central Tanzania). We will be starting a new relationship with a diocese from Kenya (Maseno North). The sabbatical will officially end in May of 2023. Fr. Rick will report back to the congregation and diocese following the time away. During his weeks away, other people will be pastorally on-call and a priest will be taking the services for that Sunday. Fr. Rick will not be available. Thank you to Rev. Kristin Lee, Rev. Jim Stewart, and other clergy for helping with coverage!

CULTURAL BLIND SPOTS SERIES #3

Join us for our third and final conversation in this *Cultural Blind Spots* series. Cherokee Brown and Lilly **Zuniga, both Native Americans,** who work with the Arapaho and Shoshone tribes on the Wind River Reservation, will be the main presenters. We first contacted them just as the Federal government's report on Indian Boarding Schools was released.

Sharing stories and listening continue September 25, 2022, at 2 pm, in the Parish Hall, Cherokee and Lilly, bring us experiences that may be hard for us to hear. Their focus will primarily be on the Indian Residential Schools, our Episcopal Church involvement in the Wind River Reservation, and reactions to the newly released (May 2022) report from the federal government and what it might mean to our Episcopal community.

According to the report, from 1819 to 1969 the federal government operated 408 Indian boarding schools through different denominations. The report outlines the investigation's findings that the boarding school system attempted to assimilate American Indian, Native Alaskan and Hawaiian children into white American culture using methods such as changing their names, cutting their hair, disallowing use of their native languages and other cultural practices, and forcing them to do military drills.

The Treasures in Our Sanctuary

Another in a continuing series on church fixtures and ornamentation...

St. Mark's is fortunate in having beautiful stained glass windows throughout the church and sanctuary. During the recent Capitol Campaign, state of the art external protection was installed on all of the windows so that they will continue to add beauty and color to our worship for decades to come.

This month we will focus on the three largest windows. To the north of the altar is the Nativity Window bearing the inscription, Unto us a child is born: Unto us a Son is given There shall come forth a rod out of the stem of Jesse and a branch shall grow out of his roots.

To the south of the altar is the Resurrection Window. Its inscription reads, The Third Day He again from the dead. The Resurrection of Christ is depicted on this window, a companion to the Nativity scene shown on the window to the north.

Both windows were designed and produced by Cox & Sons, a noted London-based stained glass house. They were installed in 1887 during the construction of the church.

The Good Shepherd window is centered on the west wall above the font and columbarium. It is inscribed, The Lord is my shepherd: I shall not want He leadeth me beside the still waters. It is also a Cox & Sons creation and was installed in 1888.

All three windows were given as memorials to past members of St. Mark's.



Embracing the St. Mark's Family

On August 25th St. Mark's own Byson Taylor graduated from Basic Military Training at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio Texas. After graduating from Central High School, Byson shipped off for almost eight weeks of basic training as part of the 569th Bulldogs Flight, where he learned the values of the Air Force. Integrity – An Airman is a person of integrity, courage and conviction. They must be willing to control their impulses and exercise courage, honesty and accountability in order to do what is right even when no one is looking. Service Before Self – An Airman's professional duties take precedence over personal desires. Every Airman is expected to have the discipline to follow rules, exhibit self-control and possess respect for the beliefs, authority and worth of others. Excellence In All We Do – An Airman strives for continual improvement in self and service in order to propel the Air Force further and to achieve greater accomplishment and performance for themselves and their community.

Following his graduation Byson heads to Keesler AFB in Biloxi, MS where he will attend his technical school to study radar, air traffic control and weather systems until March of 2023. After that, the plan (right now) is to enroll at the University of Wyoming in the fall of 2023.

Byson regularly attended church services on the base and commented to his parents that his relationship with God grew stronger over those eight weeks.


